
Summer Activities:

A message from Essex County Council:

Now it's the school holidays, we're strongly encouraging all adults and secondary school children to self-test twice a week.

Testing is a key line of defence against the spread of Covid-19. With other protective measures such as face coverings and social distancing no longer legally required, testing is even more important. It's the only way to know if you have Covid-19 and make sure you don't spread it to friends and family. As many as 1 in 3 people do not show any symptoms so self-testing can detect these hidden cases and keep everyone safe.

You can <u>collect packs of self-tests from</u> <u>libraries and pharmacies</u>. Alternatively, they can order self-tests online.

If someone develops symptoms, they should <u>order a different type of test (a PCR test)</u> or call 111, and self-isolate immediately.
