This report shows how Jotmans Hall Primary School plans to use the Pupil Premium Grant 2014/15 and the anticipated impact on the pupils targeted.

Strategies were put in place to try to ensure that the Pupil Premium Group attained the same success rate in the Phonics screening test as the rest of the cohort. They all passed the test, exceeding the success rate for the whole cohort - an excellent result.

13 pupils in Year 2 who had to re-take the Phonics Screening Test all passed - 100% success rate. 4 of these pupils were in receipt of Free School Meals. So they achieved the same success rate as their whole cohort - an excellent result.

Attainment of this group was not as high as the rest of the cohort, however their attainment was judged as "Average" as was the rest of the cohort when compared to the previous year's data. This showed that Pupil Premium pupils' attainment was affected to a small degree, but not significantly compared with the rest of the cohort.

<u>Progress</u> by Pupil Premium pupils in Maths was "Outstanding" (as was the rest of the cohort), However, progress by Pupil Premium pupils in Reading and Writing was only "Average" compared to "Outstanding" and "Good" respectively for the rest of the cohort.

Small group work + parent helper reading support was put in place to try to ensure that these pupils made at least expected progress by the end of Key Stage 1. Overall, the gap between the achievement of Pupil Premium pupils and the rest of the cohort was not very wide (around 2. APS), with the exception of Reading where it was over 3 APS. The overlap between pupils with Special Educational Needs and Pupil Premium means that sometimes the results are skewed since the attainment of pupils with Special Educational Needs would, generally, be lower.

The above results show that Pupil Premium pupils did exceptionally well - with outstanding progress in all subjects assessed. This is due to all the initiatives which have been in place for several years now and have ensured that the gap between financially disadvantaged pupils and the rest of the cohort has been reduced to almost nil.

1:1 tuition was offered to all pupils in this group whose progress was causing concern in Year 5 and 6 and this has resulted in accelerated progress across this period. SENCO reading group, small group work + parent helper reading support was put in place to ensure that these pupils made at least expected progress by the end of Key Stage 1. The higher ability pupils had literacy and numeracy challenges to ensure that their progress was also boosted in recognition of their higher ability needs.
